ADDRESS OF THE RIGHT EMINENT GRAND COMMANDER EMORY J. FERGUSON 1988-1989

I welcome you to the One Hundred Twenty-Ninth Annual conclave of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama. For those of you who are visiting for the first time I extend to you a very special Alabama welcome and hope that you will enjoy your stay well enough to want to return again and again. To those of you who have visited before, I welcome you back and wish for you a most pleasant stay. To the Grand commanders from our sister jurisdictions I am most pleased and honored to have you present. I think that each of you know that you and your wives have become very special to me this past year and your very presence here makes this Conclave very special to Bobbie and me.

STATE OF THE ORDER

I have mixed emotions concerning the State of the Order. On one hand, at times, I detect a gleam of hope for the preservation of the Order, yet on the other hand, at different times, I truly wonder if the Sir Knights have not conceeded the eventual extinction of the Order. RECOMMENDATIONS

Because the Triennial Reserves for the first four Grand Officers, Grand Recorder, and Past Grand Commanders are budgeted yearly, I recommend that a separate bank account be established so that the entire amount will not be expended in a single year as it was during my term of office. The monies that are budgeted for a particular item in a given year should be expended or withdrawn from the general fund in the year for which it was designated.

I also recommend that the quarterly meetings for the Grand Commandery officers be continued. Perhaps some day the Grand Officers will realize what a valuable asset these meetings can be in keeping them informed as to happenings and problems of the Grand Commandery, and attend them on a regular basis.

SPECIAL EVENTS

This has been a very special year in Alabama for me to have had the honor of serving as your Grand Commander. There have been some events that have occurred in this state which have never occurred here before and in some circumstances may never occur again, and I have been honored to have been a part of them.

For the first time ever the Supreme Assembly of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls met in Alabama in Mobile. I was invited to, and accepted the invitation to attend, all the sessions, receptions, tours, breakfasts, luncheons, and banquets of the Supreme Assembly. I was also honored to extend a welcome to the Assembly at the formal opening of the session on behalf of the Grand Commandery. This was certainly one of the highlights of my year.

Another first for Alabama was the Social Order of the Beauceant's Supreme Assembly which was also held in Mobile. Again I was honored to have the opportunity to welcome these ladies and their escorts to Alabama on behalf of the Grand Commandery.

I had the privilege of arranging and hosting the first Southeastern Grand Commanders Council which was convened at the Guntersville State Park on October 29-30, 1988. All of the Grand Commanders, with the exception of Sir Knight Robert H. Kines of Georgia, along with the Southeastern Department Commander, Sir Knight Joseph Brackin, and the junior past Southeastern Department Commander, Sir Knight Edward Saunders, and our wives were present. Other than enjoying a wonderful Alabama Fall weekend it was concluded that this group would do something positive for Templay which you will hear later from Sir Knight Brackin.

I also had the privilege of presenting a paper, "Freemasonry: The Positive Side", at the Southeastern York Rite Conference in Jackson, Mississippi. A lot of work but a wonderful experience.

Of all the honors I had bestowed on me this year the greatest honor of all was when I conferred the Order of the Temple and knighted my Dad a Knight Templar at Mobile Commandery No. 2 on December 17, 1988.

CONCLUSION

As Grand Commander I have attempted many new things this year. I have attempted to keep the Sir Knights informed as to the activities of the Grand Commandery through the Alabama Supplement of the Knight Templar Magazine, and I have attempted to recognize some of the Sir Knights for their accomplishments through the same medium. With the help of the Templar Education Committee we developed and distributed a questionnaire to the Sir Knights and the results were also printed in the Alabama Supplement, and with the help of the Public Relations Committee we developed and distributed a 30 second public service announcement which was aired on public radio throughout the state concerning the Knight Templar Eye Foundation. We held a one day

Statewide York Rite Festival in Montgomery at which the Grand Commandery Officers conferred the Order of the Temple, and we held a School of Instruction at the Cyrene Commandery No. 10 in Birmingham. As I promised when I assumed office last year I have visited every Commandery in the state. What, if anything, all of this has done to promote the York Rite in Alabama possibly only time will tell, but I firmly believe that "if you're not trying, you're dying", and maybe we're not trying enough in the York Rite.

Sir Knights, it has been a wonderful experience serving as your Grand Commander this year and I thank you for allowing me to do so. Everywhere I have

gone I have been received with courtesy and kindness.

To the Sir Knights of the Huntsville Commandery No. 7, I can not adequately thank you for all that you have done for me over the years. Anything that I may have accomplished in the York Rite of Freemasonry has been because of your

support and confidence and I shall ever be grateful to you.

It has been a pleasure to have had the opportunity to serve this year with the Most Excellent Grand High Priest, William M. Newsome, Jr., and the Most Illustrious Grand Master, Brent R. Haller. The many occasions that Bobbie and I have shared with the Newsomes, Bill and Myron, have been a delight and although we have had few opportunities to share with the Hallers, Brent and Lonnie, those few occasions have been a joy.

I extend my thanks to all the Grand Commandery Officers and for all who accepted appointments to committees, both standing and special, and a special thanks to Sir Knight Thomas W. Mann, Grand Recorder, and his office staff for another year well served. Without the talents of such dedicated Sir Knights the

Grand Commandery could not survive.

To Bobbie, and all my girls, Yvette, Denise, Nan, and Missy, I love you for just being you because you love me for just being me. Thanks for always standing behind me whether I am right or whether I am wrong, and thanks for all the times you have understood when I wasn't there when I should have been.

To Sir Knight Charles W. McDonald, I pledge you and your Grand Officers my full support in the coming year and wish for you the most successful Templar year

ever.

- NOTE 4: Exemption from Income Taxes The Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama, Birmingham, Alabama, is exempt from Federal income taxes under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c). An informational tax return is filed each year on IRS Form

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE CRAFT

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama:

We, your Committee on State of the Craft, submit the following report:

Reports from various sources would indicate that the State of the Craft is in good order. Finances are available for research and other charitable programs. Alabama is, however, in need of additional contributions to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation. We receive much more assistance than the contributions we give. With all favorable reports we might conclude that all is great in York Rite. There are, however, reasons why we connot be complacent.

The mere existance of a committee on State of the Craft should raise questions by the members about the reason for such a committee and concern about the well being of York Rite, as well as Masonry in general. Therefore we have taken a critical look at our Fraternity.

Signs of decadence abound. When we apply the yardstick of membership statistics, our conclusions leave cause for concern if not outright alarm. In the time of an affluent society and ever increasing population, our membership is declining. This decline is even more alarming in the Blue Lodges which are our source of strength and the future of York Rite. This malaise is general in nature. We are unable to pinpoint one area where decline is worse than any other area. One area we examined did show a significant membership gain, but it represented a "carrot on a stick" situation and future interest by those so enticed is at this point purely speculative.

The statistics of mortality point to a steady decline in members since the average age of the membership is sharply rising. This should tell us that we are not competing for the interest and desires of our youth. Unfortunately degeneration breeds more degeneration, and the morale of the members slips more and more as it takes its devastating toll of enthusiasm.

Loss due to N.P.D.'s is in some cases due to illness or destitution which should not happen if we are properly concerned about our brothers, but the greatest problem that causes N.P.D.'s is disenchantment. We feel that this problem should be of major concern and demand first consideration for changes to stem the tide of membership decline.

It is evident by use of attendance records that the York Rite is in many cases used as a means to join the Shrine. The percentage of this group is impossible to estimate. We need to examine our program and see why we have failed to impress these members with the values of York Rite sufficiently to maintain their attendance and support. The Shrine has seriously considered withdrawing from Masonry. If this happens would it be a serious blow to our membership rolls?

Unfortunately we sometimes receive members that are looking for some personal or potential gain by being part of a respected and honored fraternity. We hope these are few. We need to look at the good dedicated service of our charities, research programs, and humane efforts promoted by inspired and committed members, and involve more members in these programs.

Attendance, or lack of it, is the foremost evidence of the well being of our York Rite. It is infallibly true that individuals set their own priorities. If they have an interest in something, they will be part of it. Coming to meetings when the same ritual is repeated again and again will, through pure boredom, cause many to withdraw their attendance. Occasionally special programs or events will be successful in obtaining substantial increase in attendance, but it is very short lived. This should tell us that our members are looking for something interesting. Are we not capable of providing "food for the soul"? It is true that some members are enthusiastic in learning and presenting the ritual. This is a small percentage. It is our belief that more are interested in explanations of the great lessons taught in the degrees and in the history of Masonry. We mention our ancient landmarks and the value of the ritual to our new members, but we never get around to themselves.

The York Rite embodies the principles and morals of the Christian religion, and as part of Masonry from its beginning, was deeply involved in practicing these through activities of its members in their everyday lives among the people in their individual communities. Each member was a living example of the source for social good. There were few, if any, other organizations outside of Masonry that provided the charitable and social needs of the society, churches being the major exception. We now have many civic and charitable organizations that compete for the time of our younger generation. In addition, we have Boy Scouts, Little League Ball, Indian Guides, and a proliferation of such organizations that compete for their time. Television has become a detrimental and mesmerizing influence on members and potential members. Non-attendance has been enhanced by its hypnotic results. We have permitted our stotic approach to social change to render Masonry non-competitive.

We need to get our public image re-established. Attacks by certain church groups and varied uninformed radicals have, to some degree, gained the ear of the inquisitive and doubting public. It is true that we do not need direct confrontation with these spreaders of ill will toward Masonry, but we need to tell our story in its true form on every worthy occasion. We have too long let our fraternity be accepted as a secret organization. All that can be revealed should be revealed, especially to those who condemn everything that indicates any degree of priviledged information.

York Rite can no longer afford the complacency of looking to the Grand Lodge to rejuvinate the Blue Lodges and correct the decline in membership. Its practices are as fixed as the Rock of Gibraltar and ancient as the pyramids. We must find some means to appeal to the younger generations with the same great truths and the same great moral teachings that we have caused to endure in our Craft through the ages.

Your Committee does not claim to have an answer to the problem or problems of the Craft. We do feel that it is time for some corrective action to be taken. Certain possibilities have been hinted in the above portion of the report, and we wish to offer the suggestions which follow for your consideration.

First and foremost, we need to know and understand what the role of York Rite should be in today's world. Therefore, we think it is necessary to explore our social change in recent years with much concern and in great detail, for the purpose of being better able to serve in this modern society. The nature of man has not changed. He still has a need to serve a useful purpose and an all encompassing desire for knowledge. We must provide these needs if we expect to attract his attention and maintain his participation. A self study (York Rite) should be adjunct to an exploration of social change.

We propose that you look at your meetings and programs in detail with the purpose of determining what they provide for benefit of individual members. Are they sufficient to maintain the on-going interest of all members? Are they planned, educational, and continuous? Do they provide satisfying fellowship and social activity?

We would expect the suggested study to accomplish several things. First, we would expect it to result in changes that would benefit individual members and reinstill the spirit of Masonry. In doing this we would expect York Rite members to renew their interest in the Blue Lodges and inspire similar changes in them. There is hope also that we could again look for special qualities in our members and not worry about quantity. Most of all we expect desirable changes that result from such study to awaken the Grand Lodge and subordinate Blue Lodges to their pending collapse without an adjustment to the world in which we live.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RAINBOW

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama:

We, your Committee on Rainbow, submit the following report:

The International Order of Rainbow for Girls, is a youth organization, sponsored by the Masonic Bodies, and supported by the Order of the Eastern Star and other Masonic affiliated Bodies. The Rainbow for Girls is devoted to the purpose of training and teaching young girls from age 11 to their majority age of 20 years, to enter into womanhood as responsible adults. The tenents of Rainbow are promulgated on a belief in God, a love for Country, to respect and honor her parents, and responsibility and fellowship for her fellowman and herself.

The organizational seat of the Supreme Assembly is located in McAlester, Oklahoma, and is headed by Mrs. Gladys Skidmore, Supreme Worthy Advisor. The Supreme Officers and the members of the House of Gold, the adult executive council of the Supreme Assembly, met in executive session July 21, 22, 23, & 24, 1988, with all fifty Supreme Officers and members of the House of Gold in attendance. The Supreme Assembly opened in general session July 25, 26, & 27, 1988, in Mobile, Alabama. This was the 32nd biennial Supreme Assembly session and the first to be held in Alabama. There were 1,872 Rainbow Girls registered for the session, representing all 40 of the United States and 7 foreign countries. Approximately 2,500 persons attended the entire Supreme Session, including visitors and Rainbow Girls. The session was attended by Mrs. Skidmore, Supreme Worthy Advisor and 70 Supreme Assembly members. In attendance were Floyd Hambrick, Jr., Most Worshipful Grand Master, Alabama Grand Lodge, F&AM, and other Grand Lodge Officers; Mrs. Helen R. Cox, Most Worthy Grand Matron, and Ray McRoberts, Most Worthy Grand Patron of the General Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, eight General Grand Chapter Officers, and Committee persons; Mrs. Jackie Motley, Worthy Grand Matron, and several officers of the Alabama Grand Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star. Other Masonic Bodies attending were represented by Charles A. Sweeney, Grand Inspector General, Advisory Committee, Valley of Mobile, AASR; William M. Newsome, Jr., Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Alabama; Brent R. Haller, Most Illustrious Grand Master, Grand Council of Royal and Select Masons of Alabama; Emory J. Ferguson, Right Eminent Grand Commander, Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama; William Baxter, Potentate, Abba Shrine Temple of Mobile, A.A.O.N.M.S.; Robert H. Hannon, Grand Master of the International Supreme Council, Order of DeMolay; Ray R. Morgan, Jr., Executive Officer in Alabama, active member of the International Order of DeMolay; Matthew P. McCrickard, State Master Councilor in Alabama, Order of DeMolay; and many Past Grand Officers of F&AM and OES.

Many thanks and much gratitude is expressed by Mrs. Hazel M. Elliott, Supreme Nature and Supreme Inspector in Alabama, Order of Rainbow for Girls, to the Grand Lodge, F&AM of Alabama, the Grand Chapter O.E.S. of Alabama, the Grand York Rite Bodies of Alabama, the Scottish Rite Masonic Bodies of Alabama, and all subordinate Bodies in Alabama, for the tremendous support rendered by the many generous

donations and many hours of labor and travel. Without the understanding, goodwill, and appreciation by the sponsoring and supporting Bodies and individuals, the Supreme Session could not have been the tremendous success that it was.

The Grand Assembly Session was held in Montgomery, Alabama, in August, 1988. The Session was led by Mrs. Hazel Elliott, Supreme Nature and Supreme Inspector in Alabama. The Grand Assembly Officers were in attendance. Two hundred seventeen Rainbow Girls were registered for the session with approximately 400 girls and visitors attending the session. Grand visitors greeted and introduced at the sesson were: Floyd L. Hambrick, Jr., Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge, F&AM of Alabama; Mrs. Jackie Motley, Worthy Grand Matron, O.E.S.; Doyle W. Ealy, Grand Inspector General Advisory Committee, Huntsville Scottish Rite Masons; Emory J. Ferguson, Right Eminent Grand Commander, Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama; several Grand Rainbow Representatives from other states and seven Grand Officers of the Grand Lodge, and Grand Chapter, O.E.S.

Mrs. Hazel M. Elliott, Supreme Nature and Supreme Inspector in Alabama, presented the 1988 Annual Report as follows:

- a. Fifteen trips were made to Mobile for planning and coordination of the Supreme Assmbly session.
- b. All ten of the Alabama Subordinate Assemblies were visited by the Supreme Inspector and the Grand Worthy Advisor.
- c. Three Schools of Instructions were held in the three regional divisions of the state.
 d. A Christmas party and reception dinner were held in Huntsville for the Alabama Grand Assembly Officer.
 - e. A Grand reception and tea were held for the Grand Worthy Advisor.
- f. Thirteen \$100.00 scholarships were given by the Grand Assembly for deserving Rainbow Girls planning to attend college.
- g. One new Assembly was instituted under letters temporary at Pisgah, Alabama. The Assembly was sponsored by the Pisgah Masonic Lodge, Pisgah O.E.S. Chapter, and underwritten by the Huntsville Scottish Rite Bodies with a three hundred and twenty-five dollar donation to the Assembly.
 - h. The initiation age of incoming initiates was lowered from age twelve to eleven.
- i. The tenure of office for Assembly officers was extended from four months to six months in order to provide more leadership training to the incumbents.
- j. The Southern Belles, a Southern-dress drill team, performed at the Alabama Grand Chapter, O.E.S. Annual Meeting, the Supreme Assembly Session, the State Grand Assembly Session, the General Grand Chapter, O.E.S., in Atlanta, Georgia, and other events.
- k. Eighteen Rainbow Girls and eight sponsoring adults were awarded the Grand Cross of Color and feted at a banquet at the Grand Assembly Session. The Grand Cross of Color is awarded to deserving Rainbow Girls, Adult advisors, and Sponsors who have contributed significant and outstanding service in the advancement of Rainbow.
- 1. The annual report showed three hundred and fifty-six members in Alabama in 1988. Gains and losses were unavailable. These figures are provided by the Supreme Assembly and have not been released. Approximately one hundred girls were initiated and approximately sixty were lost due to reaching their majority age of twenty. No information on losses due to nonpayment of dues, marriage, moving away, or demiting was available.

In her concluding remarks, Mrs. Elliott stressed the need for adult participation and sponsorship for the continued growth of the Rainbow in Alabama. She further stated a need for at least two more Assemblies in Alabama, one in the Gadsden-Anniston area and one in the Tri-Cities area. She further stressed the urgent need for adult initiative and sponsorship in these two locales to form these two needed Assemblies, and also to reconstitute the twenty or more Assemblies that have gone dark since the 1970's in other areas of the state. REPORT OF TEMPLAR BLUE RIBBON COMMITTEE

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Alabama:

We, the members of the Grand Commandery Templar Education (Blue Ribbon) Committee report the following:

A questionnaire was prepared by this Committee in early spring, 1988, to be sent to the Recorders of the several Commanderies for distribution to their membership. The reproduction and mailing of these forms to the Recorders was accomplished through the kind assistance of our Right Eminent Grand Commander. Questionnaires were mailed back to the Committee during the summer and were accepted through September 30. In October, the Committee members collated and analyzed the responses. A summary of these responses was printed in the November-December, 1988, and January-February, 1989, Knight Templar magazine, Alabama supplement section.

Frankly put, two things need to be mentioned. First, the quantity of responses received was disheartening. It is amazing to us that so few Templars cared enough to invest a few minutes and a 25-cent stamp to help us determine the very real weak points of Alabama Templary. To those who did take the trouble to respond, we say "Thank You". Secondly, at least one-third of the questionnaires received were incorrectly or incompletely filled out. Needless to say, it is impossible to glean any useful information from a survey if the data is lacking or erroneous.

We feel that the responses should be carefully studied and weighed by the Grand Commandery line officers and the subordinate Commandery officers and, where possible, steps should be taken to improve each Commandery's program. As an aid to this end, Exhibit A of this report presents a detailed summary of the results of the survey. We feel there is much room for improvement in ALL aspects of Alabama Templary, and immediately would not be too soon to start.

We thank the Right Eminent Grand Commander for the privilege of serving the Grand Commandery on this committee. It has been a real education for us, we assure you.

EXHIBIT A — CONDENSED RESULTS OF 1988 KNIGHT TEMPLAR SURVEY

The results of the 1988 Survey questionnaires mailed to Alabama Templars earlier this year have been tallied. 175 responses were received. This represents 2.7 percent of Alabama Templars. The major results obtained are given below and in articles to follow:

- 1. Average age of respondents was 58 years. It is interesting to note that the number of respondents under age 40 was only 22 out of the 175.
 - 2. 84 percent of respondents lived in large or medium cities.
 - 3. The average Commandery dues is \$21.00.
- 4 . If financially unable to pay dues, 35 percent would ask to have dues remitted and 31 percent would seek assistance from a friend.
 - 5. Most Templars (78 percent) think the annual dues should not exceed \$40.00.
- 6. The most popular method (62 percent) of raising needed income would be to have fund-raisers.
- 7. Regular Blue Lodge attendance was indicated by 37 percent of the responses; 50 percent seldom or occasionally attend.
 - 8. 112 respondents, or 65 percent, seldom attend the Commandery.
 - 9. The four major reasons for seldom attending Commandery were:
 - a. Too far from home (first)
 - b. Meeting night conflicts with work, church, or other (second)
 - c. Boring meetings (third)
 - d. Lack of communication with members (fourth)

- 10. The four major reasons for regularly attending Commandery were:
 - a. Want York Rite to grow (first)
 - b. Fellowship with members (second)
 - c. Officer (third)
 - d. Interesting meetings (fourth)
- 11. 46 respondents indicated their Commanderies use a regular newsletter; 41 percent said that the Knight Templar Supplement was used.
- 12. The responses bore little relation to the actual Commandery sizes, perhaps a reflection of the lack of communication cited in question 9.
- 13. Most respondents (64) indicated that only 11 to 20 members are in attendance when they go.
- 14. The four most popular features or events that could be used to increase Commandery attendance were judged to be:
 - a. Dinners, Fishfries, and Luncheons (first)
 - b. Regular Commandery Newsletter (second)
 - c. Community Service Projects (third)
 - d. Family Events (fourth)
 - 15. The results on feeling toward the York Rite were:
 - a. Highly Dedicated 40 respondents
 - b. Dedicated
- 30 respondents
- c. Supportived. Indifferent
- 64 respondents10 respondents
- 16. If their Commandery were about to lose its charter, the majority of respondents (87) would give up a night to preserve it; a significant number (40) would take the lead in reorganizing the Commandery.
- 17. Of things which Commanderies could do to improve themselves, the four most mentioned were:
 - a. Better communications (21 times)
 - b. Improved public relations/visibility (17 times)
 - c. Improve meeting format with education and/or entertainment (16 times)
 - d. Improve ritual (9 times)
- 18. Responses on improving Grand Commandery were more limited, but the following were the top five mentioned:
 - a. Better communications (6 times)
 - b. Improve leadership (6 times)
 - c. Education (3 times)
 - d. More (and younger) involvement (3 times)
 - e. Concentrate on charities and lessons (3 times)
 - 19. Most (85%) do not own uniforms.
 - 20. Most (68%) would not buy a uniform.
 - 21. Of those who would buy a uniform, most would pay \$100-150 for one.
 - 22. Most (65%) favored adoption of the apron, cape, sword and cap.
 - 23. Membership in Masonry was fairly evenly distributed over the categories listed.
- 24. Membership in the Commandery was composed mostly of fairly "young" Knights (44% members 10 years or less and 66%, 20 years or less).
- 25. By a slim majority, most (57%) were not members of the Scottish Rite.
- 26. Most (77%) are members of the Shrine or Grotto.
- 27. Most (69%) are not members of the Eastern Star or Order of Amaranth.
- 28. Most (63%) do not attend any other body more regularly than they attend Commandery.
 - 29. Of those who do attend other bodies more often, the four top reasons given were:
 - a. Other bodies are more attractive and/or conflict (19 times)
- b. Opportunity to mix with the general public (e.g., clowns with children) (4 times)
 - c. Use of limited time (2 times)
 - d. Transferred to closer bodies (2 times)
- $30.\ \, \text{Most}\,(65\%)$ are not members of any honorary body and another 21% are members of one or two.
- 31. Of those who responded on membership, 38% are members of 1 to 3 bodies; 47% 4 to 6; 10%, 7 to 10; and 5%, more than 10. Of those who were officers, 79% were officers in 1 to 3 bodies; 19% in 4 to 5; and 2% in more than 10. Of the presiding officers answering, 66% were presiding in 1 to 3 bodies; 30% in 4 to 6; 3% in 7 to 10; and 1% in more than 10. These last include past presiding officers.

- - 32. Of the general comments, the top four pertained to:
 - a. Time conlicts (6 times)
 - b. Outside interests (5 times)
 - c. Need to strengthen Blue Lodge (4 times)
 - d. High fees or dues (2 times)

The members of the Templar Education Committee who were tasked with conducting this survey wish to express their thanks to those Sir Knights who did take the time and trouble to fill out and mail in the survey. In most instances, the forms were filled out correctly and completely; in some cases, many of the questions were skipped or filled out incorrectly. In order for a survey like this to be truly meaningful and effective, the questionnaire should be filled out completely and accurately. Further, we were somewhat disappointed in the relatively small number who responded—perhaps it is indicative of the state of Templary in Alabama that so few could spare 10 minutes and a 25 cent stamp to do even this small task.

We sincerely hope that this effort will prove of use to present and future Commanders and Commandery Officers in providing some insight into the feelings and desires of a portion of the membership and in assisting the leadership in planning a course of action that will awaken interest in Commandery affairs and revive interest and attendance in the Order. Failure to listen to what the members want and failure to implement new programs can only result in the failure of the Knights Templar in the not-too-distant future. This Committee stands ready to assist our Commanderies in these noble efforts in whatever way it can.



"Be it resolved that the Grand Chapter, Grand Council, and Grand Commandery shall adopt a system of opening first on a rotating basis with the Grand Chapter opening first in 1989, the Grand Council in 1990, and the Grand Commandery in 1991, and this plan to be followed in subsequent years."

REMARKS OF DISTINGUISHED GUESTS

After a few remarks of appreciation from several visiting Southeastern Grand Commanders, the Southeast Department Commander, Sir Knight Joseph D. Brackin, also made a few remarks.

Right Eminent Grand Captain General of the Grand Encampment, Sir Knight James M. Ward, brought greetings from the Most Eminent Grand Master of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar, U.S.A., Sir Knight Marvin E. Fowler. Sir Knight Ward remarked it was a joy to be in Alabama and see the enthusiasm of all the Sir Knights in attendance, and thanked them for their support in his election to the Grand Encampment line.

Sir Knight Ward noted that five Commanderies in Alabama had had membership gains during the year, and that if it could happen on a local level it would also be possible in the Grand Commandery. If we want it to happen, it will happen. We can do anything we want to do if we have the desire to do it since we have the talent and wherewith all to do anything we want to do. We just need to want to do it and we can.

Statistics say that by the year 2010 Freemasonry will be down to less than 1,000,000 members. We have already lost over 1,000,000 members in the past 10 years. This is not the kind of information we are looking for. What we need to know is

what we need to be doing to make ourselves presentable to those around us in our communities.

Freemasonry, and particularly Templary, promises us nothing but the opportunity to be of service to God, to our country, to our fellowman, and to ourselves, through our Lord, Jesus Christ. There is no higher calling and we need to answer that calling. We need to take advantage of this program, we need to support it. It makes us visible in the communities in a way they can understand. It ties us to Jesus Christ in a material way, and we need that.

We are living in a different society, not just the economic but the moral and spiritual aspect as well. This society in which we live demands we meet its needs, not that we change, but that we impress on them the need to be morally and spiritually organized and oriented. We need to serve as our ancient Templars did, by providing for the needs of the distressed and protecting those that need our protection. We can do that.

Sir Knight Ward relayed the best wishes and words of appreciation from Sir Knight G. Wilbur Bell, Executive Director of the Knights Templar Eye Foundation, for the past and future contributions to this worthwhile charity. He further mentioned that the Grand Encampment recognizes Alabama's contributions to the Eye Foundation and know they are on the right path. He commended Anniston Commandery No. 23 on 100% Life Sponsors by saying, "We can all do that".



First Annual Conclave was held in Montgomery, Alabama, on Friday, November 30, 1860.

Grand Commandery Office moved from Montgomery to Birmingham after election of Thomas W. Oliver as Grand Recorder in 1962.

At the Annual Conclave, April, 1963, Earl D. Holmes was elected and installed as Grand Commander, but he died before he could serve.

At the Annual Conclave, April, 1973, Thomas W. Mann was elected Grand Recorder. Thomas W. Oliver was elected Grand Recorder Emeritus, and the Annual Conclave date changed from April each year, to last Monday in February to correspond with Grand Chapter and Grand Council

As proof of continual effort of Alabama to promote York Rite unity, the first combined meeting of the Grand Chapter, Grand Council, and Grand

On November 1, 1974, the Grand York Rite Office moved to 3621 South Fifth Avenue, Birmingham. Commandery was held in February, 1974.

September, 1979, Grand York Rite Office moved to 55041/2 North First Avenue, Birmingham, 35212.

On May 16, 1980, James A. Kile was appointed Grand Treasurer to succeed Hoyt McClendon, resigned.

At the Annual Conclave, February, 1981, Hoyt McClendon was elected Grand Treasurer Emeritus.

CHRONOLOGY

Titles of Meetings and Dates of Bodies Composed Exclusively of Masons.

The ordinary Calendar, or vulgar era, is not generally used by Freemasons in dating their official documents. They have one peculiar to themselves, differing according to their various Rites.

ANCIENT CRAFT MASONS in all parts of the World, add 4,000 years to the Christian era, calling it Anno Lucis—Year of Light; abbreviated A.L. (This fact has a symbolic reference, not because they believe Freemasonry is, but that the principles and light of the institution are coeval with the creation.) (See below.) F&AM Lodges hold "Communications."

ROYAL ARCH MASONS date from the building of the second Temple—530 B.C. Their style is, therefore, Anno Inventionis—A. Inv.—in the year of the discovery. Royal Arch Chapters hold "Convocations."

ROYAL AND SELECT MASONS date from the completion of Solomon's Temple 1000 B.C. Their style is Anno Depositionis—A. Dep.—in the year of Deposit. Royal and Select Councils hold "Assemblies."

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR date from the organization of the Order in 1118 A.D. Their style is, therefore, Anno Ordinia—A.E.—in the year of the Order. Knights Templar Commanderies hold "Conclaves."

ORDER OF THE HIGH PRIESTHOOD dates from the blessing of Abraham by the High Priest Melchezadak, which occurred 1914 B.C. Their style is Anno Benedistionis—A.B.—in year of the Blessing. Councils of Annointed High Priest hold "Convocations."

ANCIENT AND ACCEPTED SCOTTISH RITE MASONS use the Jewish Calendar, which adds 3760 to the Christian era, styled Anno Mundi—A.M.—year of the World. Or, they sometimes use the Hebrew year which begins on the seventeenth of September, or feast of Tisri, using the initials A.H.—Anno Hebraico.

TEMPLES, A.A.O.N. MYSTIC SHRINE: Each thirty years from the Hejira, or July 15th, A.D. 602 constitutes a cycle. Nineteen of these years contain 355 days, Eleven, 356.

RULES FOR MASONIC DATES

ANCIENT CRAFT MASONS — Add 4,000 years.

Thus: 1989 + 4,000 = A. L. 5989

ROYAL ARCH MASONS — Add 530 years.

Thus: 1989 + 530 = A. Inv. 2519

ROYAL AND SELECT MASTERS — Add 1,000 years.

Thus: 1989 + 1,000 = A. Dept. 2989

KNIGHTS TEMPLAR — Subtract 1,118 years.

Thus: 1989 - 1,118 = A. O. 871

ORDER OF HIGH PRIESTHOOD — Add 1,913 years.

Thus: 1989 + 1,913 = A. B. 3,902

SCOTTISH RITE MASONS — Add 3,760 years.

Thus: 1989 + 3,760 = A. M. 5749
